## The Days Are Lengthening for Lent



The word *Lent* comes from the old English, *lencten*, which means *spring*. In Middle English the word is derived from the words *lenten* and *lente*; related to the Dutch, *lente*, and the German, *lenz*, also rendered *spring*. In Old German are found the related words: *lenzin*, *lengizin*, and *lenzo*, which probably come from the same root as *long* and refer to *the lengthening days*, as the earth moves from the dark of winter toward spring.\*

In the western church, Easter falls on the first Sunday after the first full moon following March 20/21, the spring or vernal equinox (meaning “equal night”) in the northern hemisphere and the autumnal equinox in the southern hemisphere. This year, the moon is full on April 18, four weeks after the spring equinox. This puts Easter Sunday on April 24. **Please note that many of our local schools will be on break for Holy Week and Easter in April. If you are out of town that week, you will have a great opportunity to visit other Christian communities and participate in their worship during this holiest week of the year.**

Lent begins forty days before Easter Sunday not including the Sundays (little Easters). This year, **Lent begins on Wednesday, March 9.** Jill will lead a contemplative service at 7 p.m. at the Middlebury United Methodist Church. This service will include walking *a Lenten labyrinth*. **Please note that the first Sunday in Lent, March 13, is the first day of Daylight Saving Time. In the spirit of spring and lengthening days, spring ahead one hour on the clock and come to church an hour earlier.**

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## Here is a brief history of the development of the forty days of Lent:

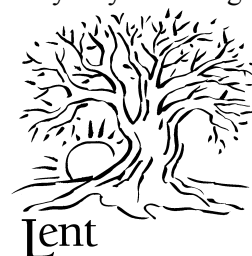
Originally, in the first century, Lent was observed as a forty-hour period, in keeping with the forty hours Jesus' body was in the tomb. This Lenten watch ended with an Easter service at three in the morning. In the third century, the forty hours evolved into an extended six days known as Holy Week. Then, the six days grew into thirty-six days, thirty-six being the tithe or a tenth of the 365 days of the calendar year. Finally, during the reign of Charlemagne in the eighth century, four days were added to the thirty-six to create our current celebration of Lent. The added days were Ash Wednesday, which begins the Lenten season, and the following three days leading up to the first Sunday in Lent. The forty days of Lent (Sundays are not included, for they are the Lord's day on which the celebration of the resurrection always occurs) are a time that calls us to be dedicated to discipline and personal examination.

In Judeo-Christian history, forty is a significant number. In addition to the delineation of the time in which Jesus' body was in the tomb, the number forty appears over ninety times in our Hebrew and Greek scriptures. The number is used repeatedly to describe times of war and of peace, and to explain cultural traditions. Also, the number is an integral part of some of the better-known Bible stories. In the Genesis story of Noah and the ark, God sent rains upon the earth for forty days and forty nights. At the end of their forty years of wandering in the isolated wilderness, the Israelites began construction of a tabernacle standing on forty pieces of silver. Moses spent forty days and forty nights with God on the mountain and received the commandments. David and Solomon each reigned for forty years. Jesus fasted in the wilderness and was tempted for forty days and forty nights. After his resurrection, Jesus appeared to people for forty days before his ascension into heaven. Can you find other references to the symbolic importance of forty in the scriptures?

The dates and length of Lent are not determined in our scriptures; however, the significance of its length is repeatedly illuminated. When we celebrate the forty days of Lent, we journey with Christ from the forty-day wilderness fast, to the forty-hour entombment, to the forty-day Easter resurrection. Is God challenging you to find forty ways to begin again with Jesus? ...forty ways to go on a carbon fast? ...forty ways to change the world? May God's Spirit go with you on your early Lenten journey this year.

Lent

Traditionally, Lent has been a time set apart in the Christian year for prayer and fasting. For centuries, Lent was a time when people seeking baptism into or reconciliation with their church community would study in preparation for these events on or around Easter. How do these rich traditions and this long history translate into meaningful observance of this holy time for us? This question is before us as we embark on our Lenten journey as a community of faith.

You are invited and encouraged to participate in the Lenten Midweek Meals and Meditations that will begin on **Wednesday, March 9** and continue every Wednesday evening until April 13 at Middlebury UMC. Beginning at 6 p.m., these evenings will include a light supper and a meditation led by a different person each week. For those of you attending Sunday worship, these midweek meditations will be a meaningful complement. If you have to miss a Sunday or cannot make it to church on Sundays, these meditations will be a great way to worship during the Lenten season.

## Endowment Committee

In 2006 the church began thinking about an Endowment Committee that would allow people to make a major contribution to both the present and future financial support of the church. A new Endowment Committee was subsequently established. The Frontier Fund of the United Methodist Church allows individual churches to invest funds which would exceed regular returns otherwise held in a bank savings account. Our church invested then, and with additional amounts, the total is now over \$44,000. Each year we receive from the fund a payment of 3.5% to use for current expenses and mission projects while the fund grows in excess of those payments.

We have been with the Frontier Fund in New York. The Endowment Committee is considering transferring to the New England Conference because of our change to a new Annual Conference.

Mr. Gary Melville from Boston will be here to a meet with the Endowment Committee at 7:30 p.m. on Monday, March 7th to help with this decision.

Everyone interested is invited to attend.

## The “Good” Leaven in the Lump

*Don't you know that a little yeast leavens the whole batch of dough?*

I Corinthians 5.6b

Like your expenses at home, the expenses incurred at the church are very ‘lumpy’. In the winter months, expenses are at their highest in Middlebury because of the fuel that is needed to heat the building. In the summer months, there are very few bills besides those that come year round. Ideally, we would save up enough during the warm months so that we would have extra on hand for the lumpy, cold months. Despite our most recent efforts, we have not been able to save quite enough. ***Thank you to two anonymous families who have agreed to raise their 2011 pledge by 10% right away in order to help defray the costs that are being incurred right now.***

When the quote above was written to the Christians in Corinth, the author was expressing concern about bad behavior affecting the whole community. But I'd like to flip this scripture's meaning as I apply it to our church community and suggest that the good leaven, or yeast, can *help* the whole lump of dough rise and rise well. There may be others of you who have the capacity to match your brothers and sisters and increase your giving in these times when so many are more strapped financially than they have been in a long time. When you join in this generosity, the whole lump of dough rises and we all live in gratitude.

### News about Ripton Community Church, United Methodist

At a meeting last month with the District Superintendent, members and friends of the Ripton church expressed their wish to keep the last part of their name and their affiliation with the United Methodist Church. However, they and church leaders from East Middlebury and Middlebury UMC agreed that the Ripton church should separate from the three-point charge as of July 1, 2011. This will mean that Rev. Jill or the appointed pastor will serve only Middlebury and East Middlebury full time. Ripton will be appointed a pastor-in-charge to advise them on all matters United Methodist as they continue to discern their ministry and mission now and in the future. These three churches have been joined together as a charge for many, many years. If all of the necessary paperwork goes through and Ripton does separate from Middlebury and East Middlebury in July, we will set aside a special time to celebrate the important relationship that we have enjoyed and that we will continue to value in a new way in years to come.

Ilda Franca, Jeremias' spouse, is completing a course in clinical psychology at Africa University in Mutare, Zimbabwe so she can take a position at the Center of Hope which specializes in wellness and community based health. He also told about a special shipment of mosquito nets that was coming to join the United Nations focus on malaria prevention across Africa in the month of February. Thanks go to all who have helped with that project led by our youth.

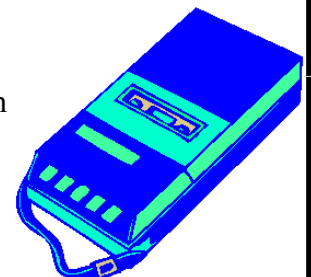
